On **June 13, 2025**, our company lost one of our own : a fellow mechanical insulator died by suicide. That tragic loss hit close to home, and it's a reminder that we need to prioritize mental health, so we never experience another loss like this again.

Let's be honest : if a coworker told you they were thinking about suicide, or if you noticed someone struggling, would you know what to say or do: For many of us, the answer is no. That's exactly why we are offering **free, voluntary suicide prevention training provided by Suicide Awareness Voices of Education (SAVE)** to anyone who wants to take it.

SAVE is a national nonprofit dedicated to the prevention of suicide through education, advocacy, lethal means safety efforts, and support for suicide loss survivors.

Think of this training as **mental health first aid**. Just like CPR teaches you how to respond in a medical emergency, this training gives you tools to recognize the signs of a mental health crisis and the confidence to step in. The more people on our team who are prepared to help, the better chance we have of preventing another tragedy.

Construction is tough work, and the suicide rate in our industry is among the **highest of any**

profession. But together, with training and resources, we can help change that. If we help just one person, this mission will be worth it.
